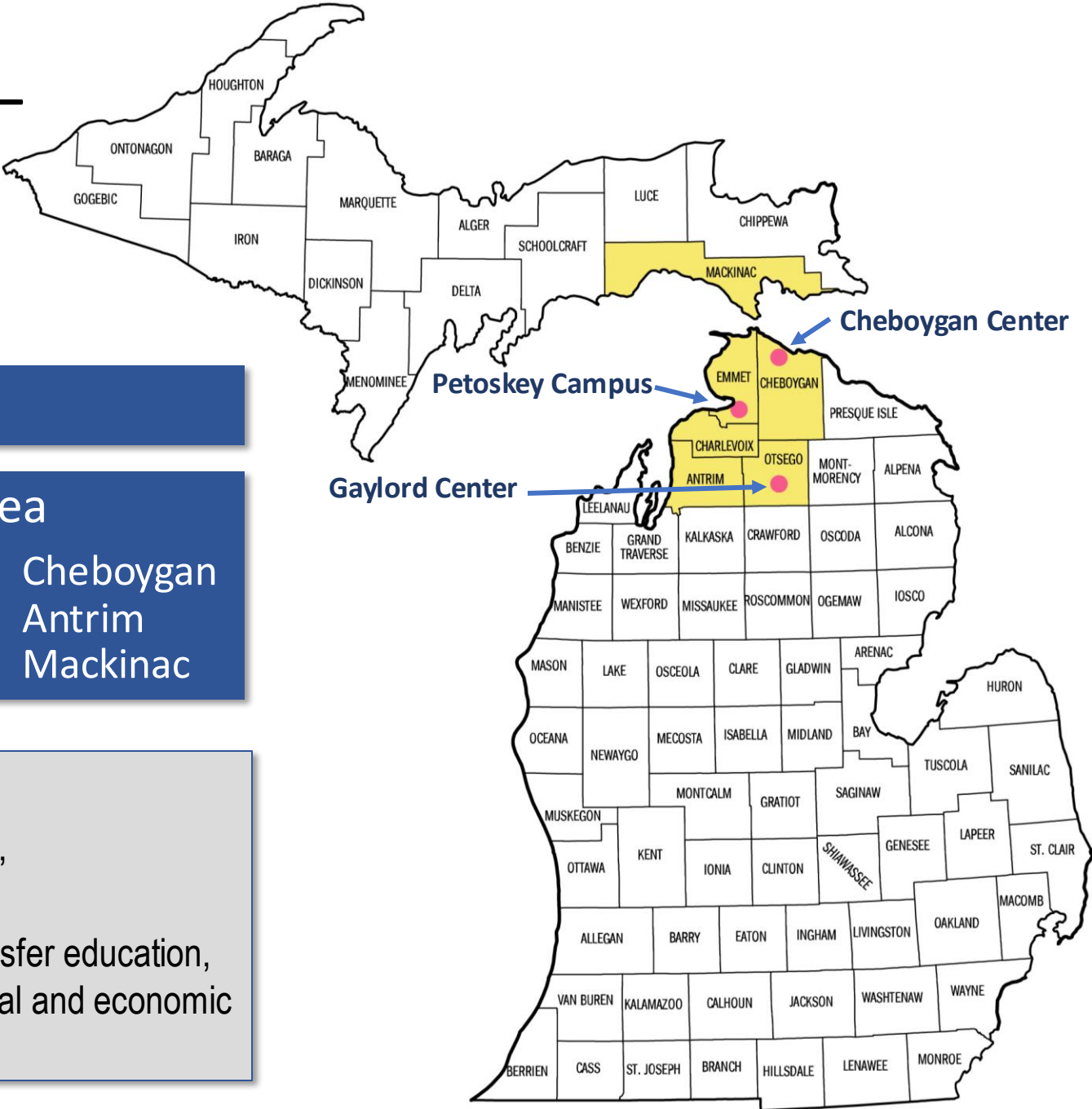

Vision

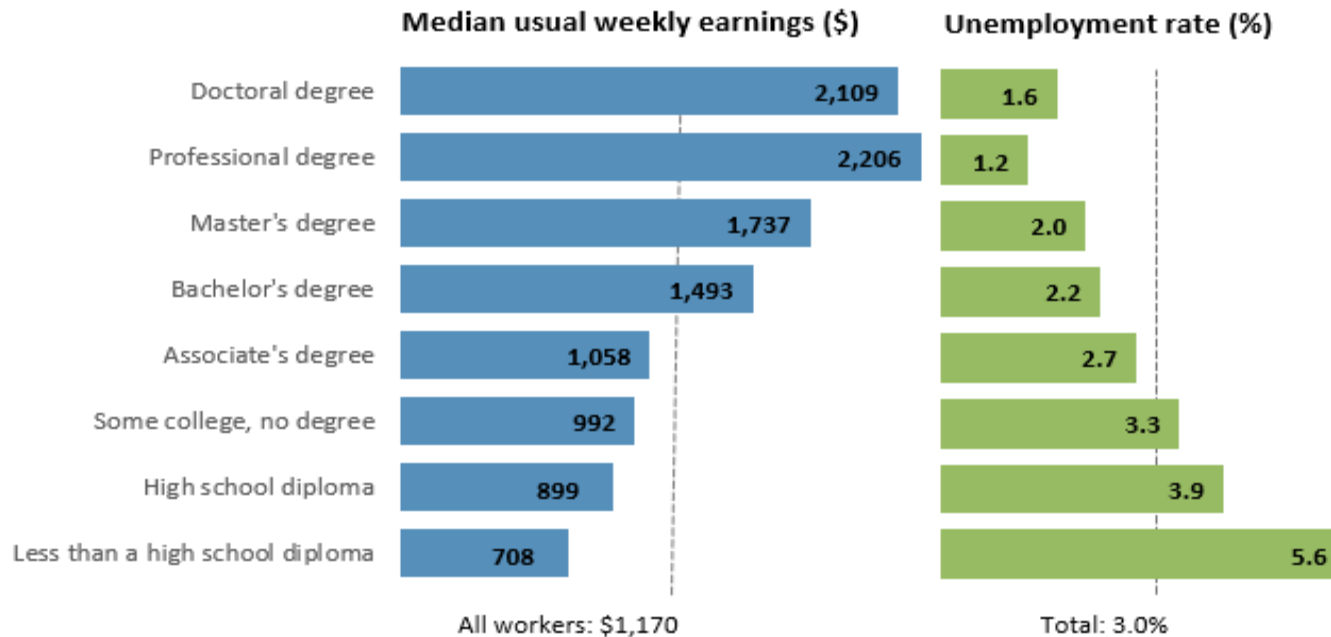
To become the premier *student-centered* college, as *partners* on the learning journey.

Earnings and unemployment rates by educational attainment, 2023

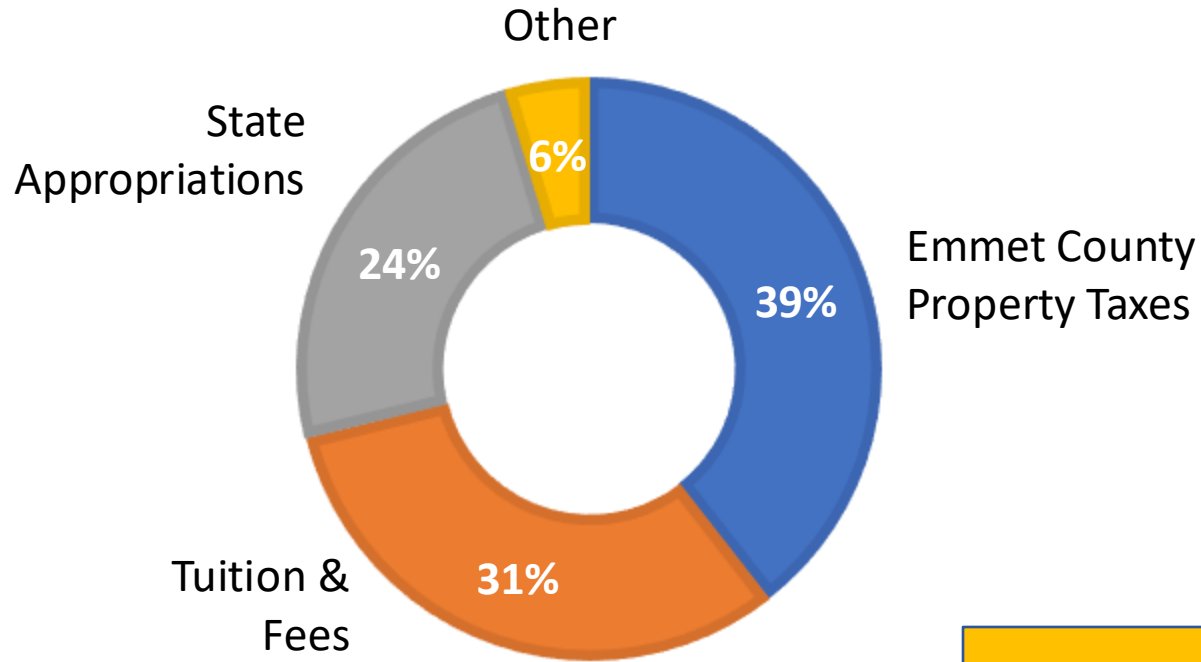

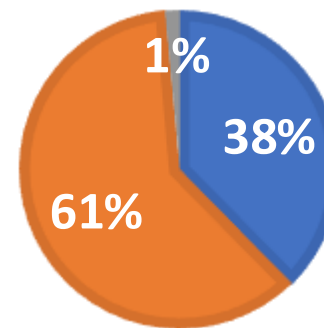

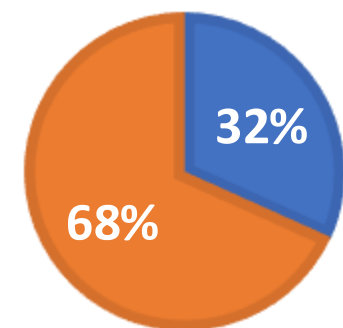


GENDER

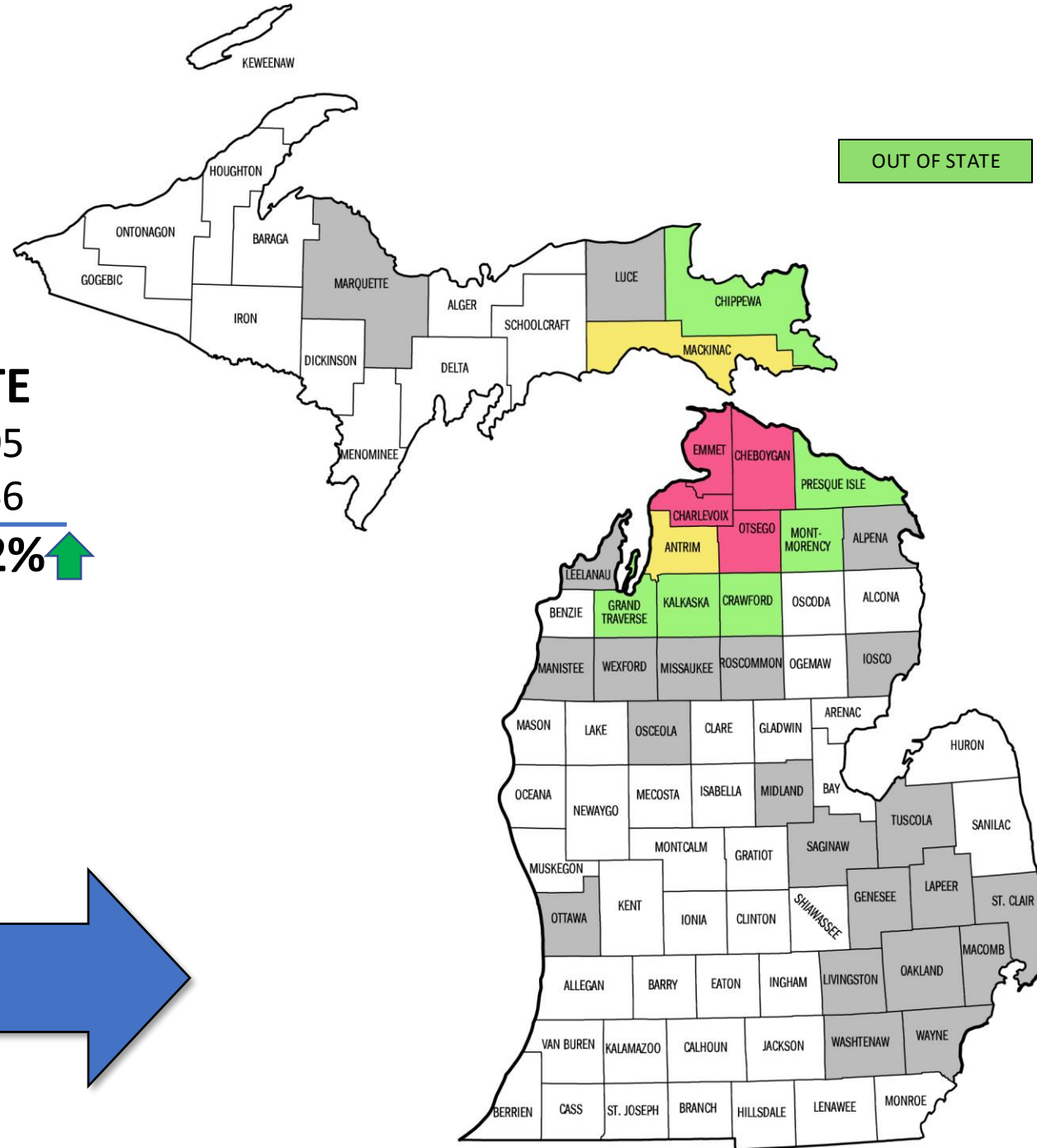

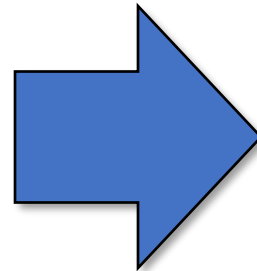

Our Early College program gives high school students the opportunity to receive both a high school diploma and an NCMC associate degree after their fifth year of high school, and the high school may pay all or a portion of a student's tuition bill.

AA, AS, AGS

- 2 can be earned 100% Online
- These degree programs are for students who plan to transfer to senior institutions.

10 Statewide Transfer Pathways

AA, AS

- 5 can be earned 100% online
- Students transfer their NCMC general education courses with guaranteed acceptance at participating four-year institutions in Michigan.

47 Occupational Programs

AAS, C, CD

- 2 can be earned 100% Online
- These career programs are designed to prepare students for the workplace rather than to transfer to a four-year college or university.

13 Fast Track Programs

Each Fast Track program can be completed in 4-24 weeks (depending on the program) and results in industry-specific certifications designed to meet regional workforce demands and employer requirements.

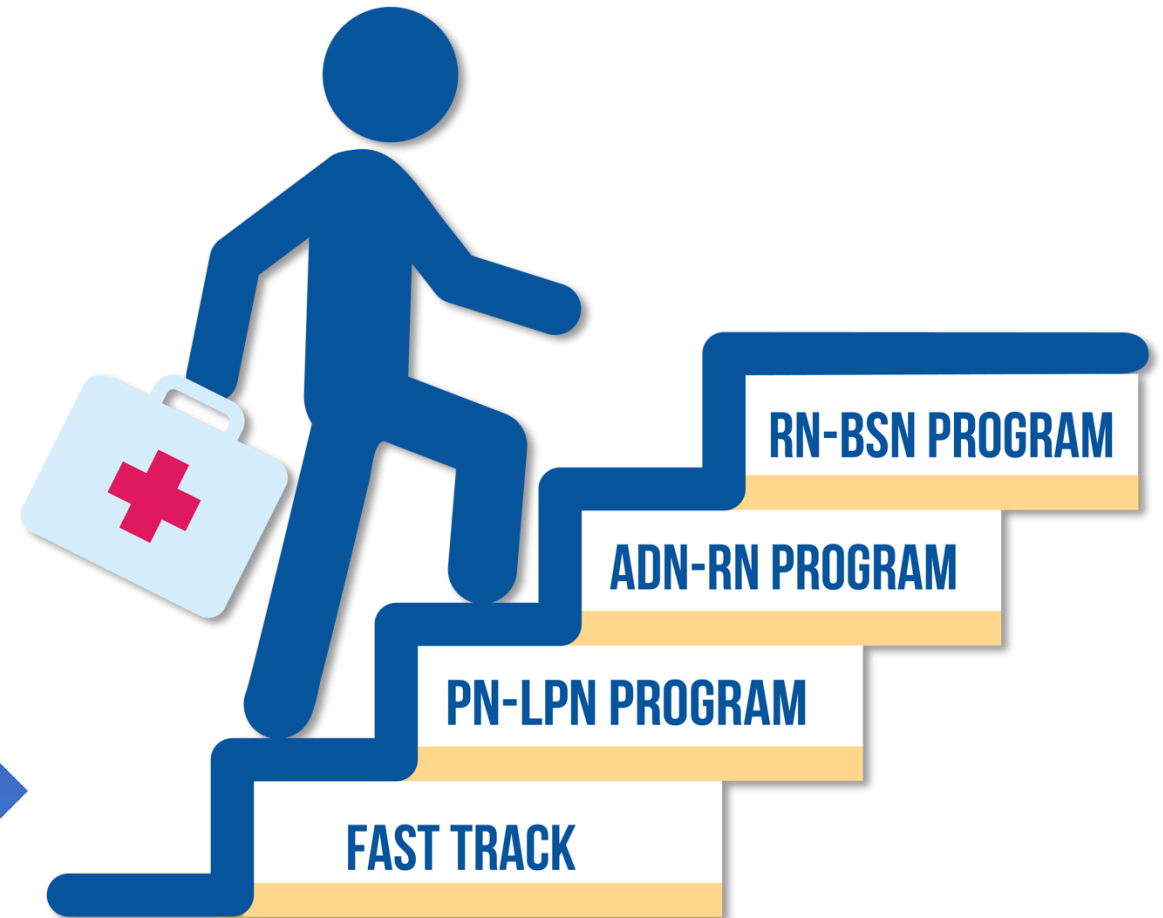
LADDERED LEARNING

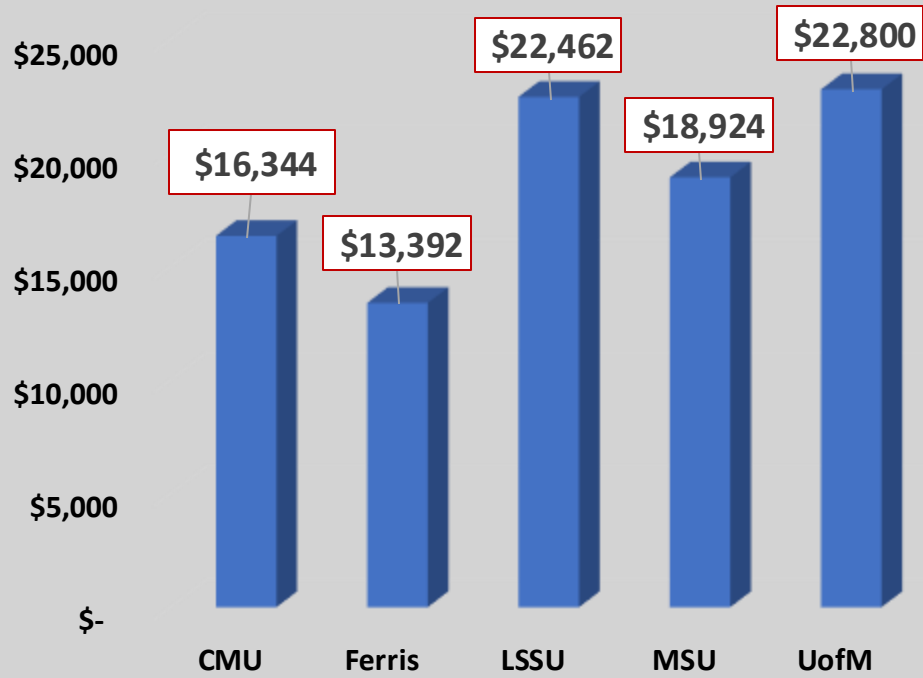

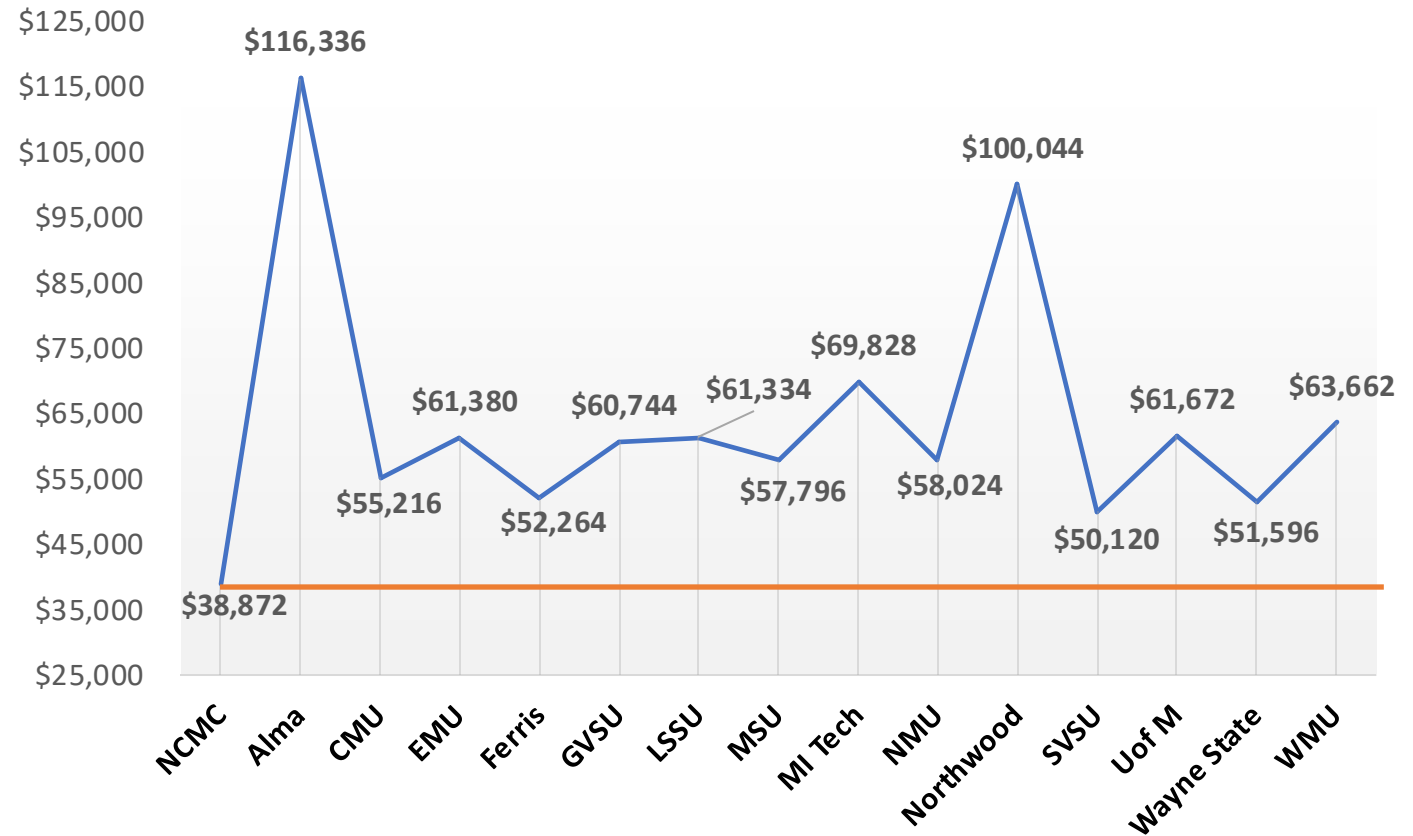
2-YEAR COST OF ATTENDANCE COMPARISON

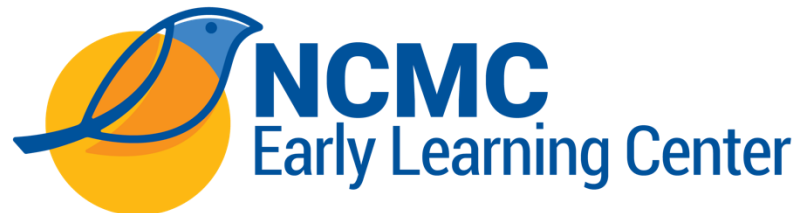
COMMUNITY COLLABORATION IN ACTION



With the support of a **Child Care Access Means Parents in School (CCAMPIS)** grant from the **Department of Education**, NCMC is supporting the success of the students with young children.

Support includes:

Phase III: NCMC's Child Care Initiative

The creation of the NCMC Early Learning Center, housed on our Petoskey campus.

The NCMC Early Learning Center will provide the mechanism for scaling-out and scaling-up the local innovations to other communities in our region and throughout the state. These innovations will:

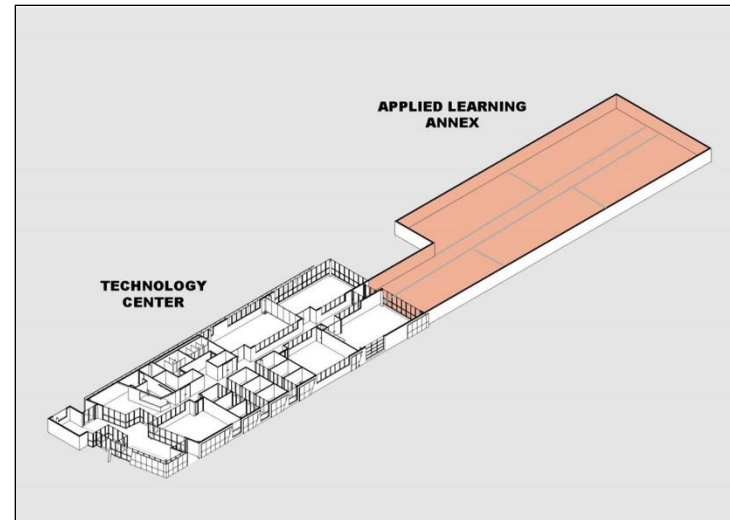
TRANSFORMING TOMORROW

New Residence Hall: Quad-Style Apartment Living

- Addresses a barrier to success for current and prospective NCMC students
- Provides additional seasonal (summer) housing for community members
- Draws new students from outside of our area



Skilled Trades Education Pathways (STEP) Center



- Grows workforce development capabilities in the construction trades (wood shop, HVAC, plumbing)
- Provides space for hands-on instruction
- Offers education for welding/metalworking and motion control (pneumatic, hydraulic, electromechanical)

Dental Hygiene (*Exploratory Phase*):

- Establishes NCMC as the only provider of dental hygiene education north of Big Rapids (Ferris State)
- Provides education in a field offering stable, year-round, high-wage employment
- Addresses a regional talent shortage
